THE COLAC CHORALE

After the challenges all choirs have faced over the last few years, the *Colac Chorale* was delighted to finally present a concert in St John's Church Colac, with its wonderful acoustics, on Sunday 20th May.

The concert was entitled *Two of a Kind* and each pair of songs dealt with an emotion. For example, *Over the Rainbow* and *Sing a Rainbow* showed optimism, *The Ash Grove* and *Where the Green Willows Grow* referred to people finding solace in nature, and *Shenandoah* and *Ashokan* expressed "I Sang my heart out". The capacity audience responded appropriately to show their appreciation.

The audience was also delighted by our guest artists, *The Geelong Youth Orchestra String Quartet*, who, in keeping with the concert theme, played two pieces by Mozart, two Hiyiko dances and a couple of Beatles hits – *Eleanor Rigby* and *Yesterday*. The quartet comprises Seth Latham, Kelly Nankervis, Angus Fuller and Olivia Sagor. They played with great maturity and musicality.

Interestingly, three generations of one family performed at our concert. Our conductor Johanna Latham was joined by her mother, our accompanist, and also by her son Seth, as first violin in the quartet.

A communal afternoon tea, where we received many appreciative comments about our concert, was a fitting finale for our performance.

WONDROUS MERRY

In June *Wondrous Merry* were performance ready for a concert *Songs and Bells at the Monastery*. We were looking forward to welcoming our friends and followers to our first full public concert since 2019! Alas! The dreaded Covid hadn't finished with *Wondrous Merry*. After feeling ill and going home during our final rehearsal, one of our members tested positive the following morning. Undaunted, we pressed on, with a final run through (in full N95 face masks) on the Thursday before the concert. Mary had a scratchy throat. Marie was 'saving her voice'. None the less, even though our basses were unavailable, we had a good sing. Our own three tenors, without bass support, gave a beautiful rendition of their new song, *John Ball*. Marie and Helen went to handbell practice the next morning, both keeping the other ringers safe by wearing their masks*. By that evening there were three more casualties – and, sadly, the decision had to be made. It was with huge disappointment that we cancelled the performance. We sent messages to those who had pre-booked tickets and all our friends, and turned away a dozen or so people who turned up anyway to our new venue – *The Monastery* in Breakwater, Geelong. On Sunday, Helen, who had been feeling smug, did a RAT test, 'just to be sure', as she was travelling to Ballarat with friends. A faint red line – leading to a cancelled trip and a week's isolation. In all five or our dozen or so singers were infected, along with sundry family members. We will reschedule our concert – waiting for member and venue availability – so we have no date set yet. Keep a watch on the <u>Choral Calendar</u> for this.

Other than our *Songs and Bells* concert, *Wondrous Merry* has three performances scheduled before the end of the year. The first is Geelong College's term *Choirs Concert* in the Keith Humble Centre at Geelong College, on **Monday Sept 11 7.30pm**. As part of Music at the Basilica's *Windfire Festival 2023*, we are presenting a free lunch time concert on Tuesday 10th October at 12.30 at St James Anglican Church, 47-55 Collins Street, Drysdale. Finally, we are once again performing at *Jam for Refugees* at St Paul's Church, La Trobe Terrace, Geelong on Saturday 28th November. This is a full day showcasing music of local musicians to raise money for refugees. We expect *Wondrous Merry* to be performing at around 5pm. All these concerts are open to the public.

An update on our singers. The Covid has gone, at least for the time being. We're back in rehearsal, with Marie taking a little longer after other health issues caused the cancellation of her trip to the UK and Europe, but we'll soon be up to full strength. We hope to welcome you to one or more of our performances soon.

We rehearse on Tuesday evenings and would welcome visitors from other choirs to come along and join us if they're in Geelong.

FOOTPRINTS THE CHOIR

Footprints has also been invited several times to provide a bracket of musical entertainment for the patrons at the local, monthly farmers market in the lovely outdoor surrounds of the Hamilton Institute of Rural Learning (HIRL) complex.

As the year progresses, we hope to reestablish our musical visits to aged care residents, which were well received in the past. We are also currently exploring other musical opportunities and collaborations in the district, to further develop our abilities and community involvement.

The next concert presented by Music at the Basilica Inc. will be *Cloudburst* featuring Melbourne based choir *Polyphonic Voices*, under Artistic director Michael Fulcher. This is on Sunday 30 July, at 3.00pm at the Basilica of St. Mary of the Angels, Geelong. The concert derives its name from a work by Eric Whitacre - *Cloudburst*, which will be performed by the choir during this concert. The work evokes the percussive impact of a sudden rainstorm in the desert – the text by Mexican poet Octavio Paz speaks of the rain awakening humanity to its connection with the earth and responsibility to care for it. One of the highlights of this concert is Rollo Dilworth's *Weather: Stand the Storm*. This is a sweeping modern epic that incorporates blues and African American spiritual elements as it positions the senselessly violent death of George Floyd and the rise of the Black Lives Matter movement against the backdrop of the isolation, inequality and confusion created by the COVID-19 pandemic. This performance is an Australian premiere.

The **14th Annual Windfire Music Festival 2023** will be held from Friday 6 October to Sunday 15 October 2023 with many varied concerts for all music lovers.

THE GISBORNE SINGERS

The Gisborne Singers performed Mozart's *Requiem* in April/May. The first performance was in the very comfortable new concert venue at St Mary's Anglican Worship Centre in Sunbury. The following week was a sell-out performance at local favourite Our Lady of the Rosary Catholic Church in Kyneton. For the first time in three years the choir was able to provide their famous afternoon tea following this performance. With artistic director Luke Severn and soloists Merlyn Quaife (soprano), Kristen Leich (mezzo soprano), Michael Petruccelli (tenor) and Teddy Tahu Rhodes (baritone), there were many accolades from the audience.

The choir then participated in the inaugural Woodend Winter Arts Festival Choral Marathon on Saturday 10th June. We were first on stage in a succession of performances by seven choirs from all over Victoria. The indoor performance was followed by an a cappella outdoor performance outside the 1853 Mechanics Institute (now an antique store) in High Street Woodend. Many of the choristers then returned to the indoor performances of other choirs. Choristers found it enjoyable and useful to hear new repertoire and to observe the varying choral disciplines that are present in different choirs. Choristers then soaked up the street vibe in the shadow of buildings floodlit with the work of a local artist before gathering together as a massed choir under the iconic clock tower to perform *No Time*, a traditional US camp meeting song conducted by *Australian National Choral Association* (ANCA) Victorian/Tasmanian President, Jenny Mathers. The Big Sing was a great success and the whole day provided a great opportunity for camaraderie amongst choir members.

The Singers are currently preparing for their winter Cabaret on Saturday July 15th. The Cabaret is usually an "inhouse" event for friends and family and allows the choir to sing lighter numbers as well as individuals to perform in small ensembles or solo. Following Cabaret, the next major performance will be Brahms Liebeslieder Waltzes which includes four hand piano accompaniment with Anna Zuidland (formerly Clarke), the choir's talented accompanist, and Elyane Laussade, esteemed guest pianist. The concert will be a one off performance at the Church of the Resurrection in Macedon on Sunday 29th October. The church was rebuilt after the Ash Wednesday fires and features a full height stained

STOP PRESS - The Festival of Voices in Hobart 2023

The 2023 Festival of Voices in Hobart treated 2000 singers to a banquet of song, community and beauty. It was my privilege to escort a group of 48 singers from *Acabellas* to the festival where we performed ten times, and enjoyed the performances of so many vocal groups from around the world.

The highlights were innumerable but here are five that spring to mind that might capture a part of the experience and inspire singers considering a trip in future years.

1. The Singing Spaces

Across the five days we performed across diverse venues including the Hobart Airport (as an arranged performance to arriving travellers), the heritage listed Hobart Town Hall, the iconic MONA gallery, the bustling FarmGate market,

the acoustically generous Elizabeth Street Mall, Hobart Library, Hobart Brewing Company and the sensitive Singers' Lounge. The latter venue was part of Salamanca Arts Centre and transformed into a deeply respectful place for singers to celebrate one another's sound under lights. The festival organisers thoughtfully programmed our group so that by merely showing up to our planned performances we toured the highlights of the beautiful harbour town of Hobart.

2. The Local Community

Hobart has a similar sized population to Geelong and yet there was something so intimate about wandering around the town. As the singing leader of Acabellas I had the opportunity to compere our gigs and share a few stories about the group and our songs. In return I was frequently approached by people in the street who had seen us at one venue or another and wanted to thank us for being in town. I was struck by the gratitude shared with me by locals for bringing original music to Hobart which locals proudly advocated as a thriving, creative place. Children performing on stage with us was a highlight as well as the audiences lustily joining us by invitation in selected songs.

3. The Diversity of Vocal Groups

I have read there are 96 Sankrit words for love and in English there is a lonely one. This inadequacy of language is also true for singing groups which are typically called 'choirs'. The diversity in presentations of songs was mind blowing and soul satisfying. A quartet of young German women in the Singer's lounge evoked mythical magic. A strong chorus of men dressed in college jackets rendered the most sensitive and complex arrangements and willingly taught us the parts when we combined to flash sing. Teenagers paying rapt attention to their conductors shaping notes and maintaining silences brought tears to the eye.

More striking for me was not the diversity of groups but diversity within groups. My hopes for humankind and the potential for peace was incredibly buoyed as I saw the composition of each group. Not an identity marker - be it ethnicity, gender, sexuality or age - seemed to underlie any group. Instead, there was a palpable uniting thread of singing - of the need to sing. When the Sydney Gay and Lesbian Chorus sang 'We Belong' by Pat Benatar I felt so proud to be a part of the assembled company which was bristling with that very notion – we belong.

4. The Collective Energy

The energy of the collective requires noting. I truly believe if the mental health of the singing community, and the audiences, was sampled at the beginning of the festival and at the end there would be significant change. It wasn't and I can't claim it to be true but it felt like there was a sense of pride and purpose. The Emergency Services Medical staff of Tasmania recently rebranded their wellbeing programme – C.R.A.G. – Celebrating Resilience and Grit and they formed a choir. They rehearsed for 8 weeks, entered and won the Festival Corporate Choirs Challenge and they were voted the People's choice. It was obvious why. As well as being delightfully funny and entertaining the audience was so pleased to see people who work so tirelessly in complex conditions sing. When you know, you know. Singing makes such a difference. When I was introduced in the Singer's Lounge as a PhD candidate researching group singing there was a spontaneous round of applause and multiple connections made by leaders wanting to contribute wisdom to my project. We singers hold something really special and the collective energy when that was being shared was so warm and peaceful.

5. The Rewilding

On a personal note, Acabellas is celebrating a year of Rewilding. This notion is taken from environmental sustainability and was first introduced to me via an anecdote about women planting a section of the Sahara with vegetation that grew so lush it brought the rains. On a community level, it felt like rewilding of ourselves was needed as well. Post Covid, the idea of travelling interstate to sing clearly appealed to many people in our singing community

with attendance in such a high number. A community sharing concert involving all our singers was hosted before we left and, along with friends and family, we raised \$1160 for Koala Clancy to expand the rewilding concept. Being away with the singers and seeing them so happy will stay in my heart and soul for many years to come.

Time and distance may be an issue, but listening to others perform is both entertaining and educational. I was delighted to attend *Colac Chorale's Two of a Kind* concert recently, and enjoyed the *Geelong Chorale's* "royal" performance. A real highlight was *Vox Angelica's* sell-out concert, *Atmosphere* — celebrating the Clarice Beckett exhibition at Geelong Art Gallery. (This concert is being repeated in September at St Paul's Church.) I always enjoy performances by the *Australian Chamber Choir*, and recently revelled in *Polyphonic Voices* collaboration with Melbourne Chamber Orchestra in works by Vivaldi. (*Polyphonic Voices* present a concert, *Cloudburst*, in Geelong on July 30th.) For those who feel remote, many performances are now online. If you're lucky, you may also be able to attend multi-choir events, such as *Sweet Adelines* symposium, (attended by *Geelong Harmony Chorus*). Choirs work to be at peak performance fitness for this annual event.

Just in is Belinda's report about the Festival of Voices held in Hobart. This is excellent wrap up of the Festival and answers so eloquently the question "Why do we sing?".

I remind everyone that the newsletter is only part of the *Choral Grapevine*. Reports of your performances are welcome at any time, as well as diary dates and concert information. I try to keep the website and Facebook page updated. The CGV is only as good as your contributions can make it.
